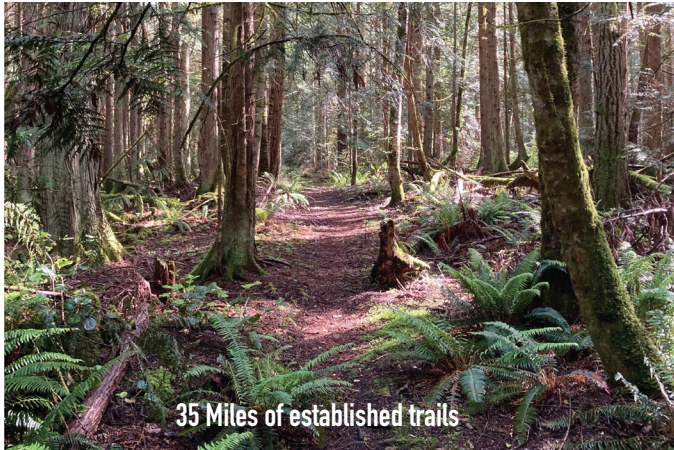

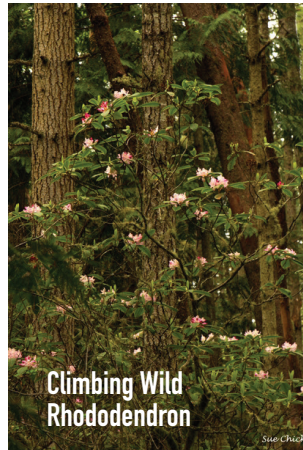

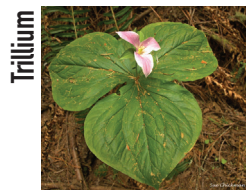


Old growth stump with logging springboard notch

Miller Peninsula State Park

can be found along the northern portion of the peninsula and consists of 2,800 acres, including 3 miles of coastal beach, as well as undisturbed forest land containing such diverse ecosystems as wetlands, complex plant and animal communities and coastal environments. These ecosystems play a vital roll in protecting the area during climatic heat as a result of climate change and recurring drought in addition to guarding the precious aquifer that lies under Miller Peninsula.

Wildlife from black bear, cougar and coyote to mule deer, Western Toads and others call MPSP home. This part of the Salish Sea coastline serves as an Ecological corridor and nesting area for many native and migrating bird species including Eagles, Peregrine Falcon, Tufted Puffins, Marbled Murrelets, Egrets, Herons and Gullems.

Washington State Parks has planning concepts to develop Miller Peninsula State Park that could include a hotel, RV & tent sites, cabins, pool/sauna, restaurant,

concessions, amphitheater & paved roads. The Coalition proposes an alternative to those concepts that preserves the Park as a natural forest area and makes it available for day use and outdoor education. Please join us in preserving this natural treasure by contacting your elected officials.
